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Principal Report

Dear Williamstown High School families,

2021 has continued to challenge us with further lockdowns and restrictions this term. Nevertheless, it has been very pleasing to see the way our school community has responded: Continuing to support student learning and wellbeing, as well as building on our resilience and flexibility. Although we once again find ourselves in lockdown with the possibility of further disruptions, and although the pandemic will change the way we do things worldwide, I genuinely believe there is light at the end of the tunnel and encourage us all to take on a growth mindset and instil hope in our young people and in each other.

Curriculum Day Postponed

With the recent return to face-to-face teaching and learning, we had a curriculum day planned for Friday, 30 July. However, mindful of our priority to have students back on site reconnecting with their peers and teachers, we made a very last-minute call to postpone this day. Our Literacy Leaders had planned an amazing day of professional learning for teachers on literacy strategies for all 7-12 classes and we will ensure this is not lost by scheduling a new date later this year. It is also worth mentioning that we had a number of families contact us and thank us for postponing this day as they too felt it was in the best interests of their children to have some time to socialise with friends. Thank you to those families who provided us with this feedback.

Standing Ovation for Chicago

This year's school production of 'Chicago' was quite simply the most impressive school production I have ever seen. From the quality of the performances to the technical excellence, this production would not have been out of place in any theatre across the arts world. We received an incredible amount of glowing feedback with one non-school community member approaching me at the end of the first showing to say she came along expecting a typical "high school production" but the performance totally blew her away. School Council Report

These are strange times and I am sure the school community joins me in our shared disappointment for opportunities missed by our children, as well as gratitude to the school staff for doing all they can to keep things moving forward. The decision-making processes for our school leadership is constantly in flux with big and small questions to consider and reconsider, such as whether or not to take curriculum days, organise school camps, continue with performances, etc. These are just some examples of everyday decisions made more complex, often without data and always waiting for the official orders from the Department.

Many of you will be responsible for decision making also and will understand how taxing and frustrating this can be. In addition, the constant movement between homeschooling and being back at school, masks on and masks off - it is all unsettling and difficult for students, staff and families. We can only hope that things will improve and that the "new normal" will somehow be imbued with valuable learnings. There is some reporting of improvement in youth resilience, for example, but there are equally reports of new struggles and the exacerbation of existing challenges.

In that context, school council continues to fulfil its duty in monitoring the governance of the school and ensuring that the values of the school continue to provide a guide for decision making. This has involved management of the ongoing building and grounds works at Pasco Campus, which have faced several challenges. It also means continuing to update school policies and to review the financial processes of the school. All of these are ably managed by staff, and our input as parent representatives is to focus on whether all appropriate stakeholders have been involved and to ensure that processes are correctly followed.

One issue that continues to come up for everyone is the litter in and around the school. The Bayview leadership has been working together with students and staff member, Tim Howie, to organise a public forum to discuss collaborative strategies for addressing the ongoing issues. The event will be open to all interested parties, including students from both campuses, family members, neighbours, Friends of the Wetlands, Hobsons Bay City Council and others. Together, we hope to be able to significantly reduce the amount of rubbish that currently blows out into the wetlands, the bay and down our drains.

There are a few contributors to the creation of litter, and it is clear that student rubbish is a large part of the issue, but there are also ongoing deposits from visitors to the area and even local dog walkers. Responsibility needs to be shared between the school and the community, but the school hopes to take leadership in improving our own ability to reduce waste at school, on the grounds and in the surrounds. We welcome your engagement in this process and encourage any reductions you can make in potential waste being sent to school by using more "naked food" approaches where possible.

We hope to see the students and teachers in class more and more over the coming months, having the opportunity to interact and be a part of our community. Until then, take care and stay safe.

End of Term 2 Celebration Assembly



Bonjour tout le monde,




Science Report
