Bayview Campus

The Student Engagement and Wellbeing team would like to take this opportunity to congratulate our students for maintaining high standards of behaviour, effort and school engagement this semester. Seeing the positive way students approach their learning and interactions with others has been extremely pleasing.

This term our Year 8 and 9 students participated in year level incursions with the organisation SEED (Self-Esteem Education and Development). These workshops targeted the theme of Respectful Relationships, specifically around the topic of friendships, and were tailored to the cohort's needs (based on a student survey). The ideas brought up during the workshops were then revisited through the homegroup curriculum. Both year levels will continue to participate in Respectful Relationships activities throughout the year.

The end of this term has marked the start of a very busy period for our Year 9 students. In week 10 students participated in exams for the first time. The exam period is an excellent opportunity for students to develop effective study habits, revise critical content as well as have an authentic exam experience in the school gym. Students should remember that this is a great chance to prepare for future exams in Years 10-12. My advice would be to look at this as a positive opportunity.

During the exam period students will also undertake the Morrisby Assessment. This initiative is fairly new to Williamstown High and provides students with a resource that helps them identify career possibilities and examine pathway data. From this test, students will receive a report that shows how their learning style may suit a range of careers. During Term 3 students will have one-on-one appointments with a career counsellor to discuss the results of their reports.

Continuing with our Year 9s, next term students will have the opportunity to attend camp. This year students will have the choice of three options:

- 1. Portsea Camp
- 2. Snow Camp
- 3. School-based Program

At the Portsea Camp, students will participate in a range of outdoor adventure activities including surf kayaking, a survivor course, giant swing, bike riding and beach walks. At the Snow Camp, students will spend the four days doing snow-based activities, with skiing/snowboarding lessons and free time on the slopes. Lastly the school-based activities will take place for students who do not elect to go on a camp.

The Year 8 camp to Roses Gap was attended by 214 students and 24 staff members. The four-day camp was a great experience for all, with students engaging in a range of activities that challenged them to get out of their comfort zones. These experiences will be invaluable for students moving forward in their high school journey.

With the Celebration Assembly in the last week of term, we look forward to reviewing and celebrating the various achievements of students across Years 7 to 9 and wish everyone a pleasant break.

Teaching and Learning Report

Learning From Each Other

"The key to improved student learning is to ensure more good teaching in more classrooms more of the time. The most powerful strategy for improving both teaching and learning, however, is not by micromanaging instruction but by creating the collaborative culture and collective responsibility of a professional learning community (PLC)."

This term's focus from the Teaching and Learning team has been on staff learning from each other. Throughout Term 2 our staff were engaging in a Professional Learning Community (PLC) cycle to improve student learning outcomes. Each PLC was asked to explore an area for student improvement that was connected to a subject area they had in common and could be identified through data analysis. Some examples of these improvement areas were: making stronger connections to prior learning in Humanities, increasing students' use of subject specific vocabulary in Visual Arts, increasing students' capacity to respond to command words correctly in Health assessments, and improving the way students approached application problems in Maths. Once an improvement area was identified within the subject area, the PLC set about developing an intervention strategy (also known as a theory of action) to try and improve student learning outcomes in these specific areas.

As part of the PLC cycle, staff were also encouraged to engage in a peer observation. Peer observations are opportunities to improve teacher practice through teacher observations with a focus on feedback, or through a teacher observing a colleague to improve their own learning. To connect the peer observations back to the PLC process, staff were encouraged to use peer observation as a way of receiving feedback on the creation, delivery and impact of their intervention strategy. This assisted the PLC to determine if their planned strategy was going to be successful, or if further improvements or adjustments needed to be made.

Staff will have the opportunity to engage in a second PLC cycle in Term 3 that will have them teamed with a different group of staff to focus on a different subject-based improvement area.

Finally, on behalf of the Teaching and Learning team I would like to thank Simon Thorley who has been working alongside me as the Bayview campus Teaching and Learning leader for the first half of this year. Simon has been successful in gaining a leadership position at a school in Geelong, where he resides with his family. Cassandra Comyns, who is currently a Learning Specialist in the Teaching and Learning area at the Bayview campus, will be increasing her capacity within the team to now lead the Bayview campus in this area for the remainder of the year. Best of luck to both Simon and Cassandra.

Bayview Campus


This semester at Bayview the Technology classes have been busy investigating, designing and making a range of products. The creativity and talent that emerges from each class is always impressive.

In Year 7 and 8, students complete a semester of Horticulture, Textiles, Food and Wood Technologies. In Year 8 and 9 there are Challenge Units and Electives on offer in each of these areas, with the addition of Photography and ICT and Robotics.

The range of designs and products has been extensive and only a snapshot is listed here. We have seen restaurant or café quality items being produced and presented in Food Tech, including pancake stacks and flourless orange cakes. The Photography class has produced high quality images for a calendar. In Wood Technology, the Year 9s have made bat boxes to help the conservation and recovery of our native bat populations. In Horticulture students have been creating and maintaining edible and aesthetic gardens and landscape designs. The soft sculpture design brief in Textiles also produced an imaginative range of products.

We welcomed a new face to our Tech team this year, Daniel Marshall for ICT and Robotics. This class has been extending the students' skills in coding, game making and robotics, including programming Lego Mindstorms to navigate an obstacle course.



In Make a Meal (Food Tech) students completed units on safety and hygiene, nutrition, meals planning and the design process. Each week they cooked up a storm linking theory to prac.


In Game Development students were engaged in planning, designing and producing an original game using GameMaker Studio; and Web Design and Infographics students collected data and presented it in original websites they designed and developed using Adobe Dreamweaver.

Fashion Design students carved rubber stamps and explored printing on fabric, discovered sustainability issues within the fashion industry, and developed folios based on the garments that they then created.

VCE: Applied Computing, Food Studies, Product Design and Technology (Textiles and Wood) students have been equally as busy with learning the subject specific coursework, completing SACs, and beginning the design process in the first component of their SAT folio work. Technology teachers are looking forward to seeing their various products/programs come to life as they are completed next term.


