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## Principal Report

Welcome to the 2022 school year. Although we are all quite excited about the road ahead and the return to “normality” in terms of school programs, the start of the year continues to provide challenges due to COVID-19. RATs, isolation protocols for students and staff, as well as online staff meetings and parent information evenings have all been areas the school community has quickly adapted to and put in place to follow COVID safe practices.

There is no place for discrimination of any kind, including homophobia or transphobia, at Williamstown High School. Safe Schools and Respectful Relationships continue to be a high priority for our school. We will continue to support all students, including lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans and gender diverse, intersex, queer and questioning (LGBTIQ+) students, to ensure they are provided with a safe and inclusive learning environment. The safety, health and wellbeing of all our students is our top priority, as is student voice and agency. Student voice is important and we continue to work closely with students and staff as we work to further strengthen a safe and inclusive environment for all. We have zero tolerance for any behaviour that makes other individuals feel unsafe and will take appropriate actions to ensure this does not occur at our school.

To build and strengthen a safe and inclusive environment for all, we are:

- Conducting professional learning for all school staff at the upcoming curriculum day. The day will feature professional learning delivered by Safe Schools focussed on appropriate interactions for all members of the school community, as well as sessions on literacy as planned from last year.
- Developing a statement highlighting our commitment to a discrimination free learning environment for all.
- Continuing partnerships with Safe Schools, Respectful Relationships and Minus 18 programs to revise and strengthen our curriculum, to facilitate workshops and incursion offerings and again, ongoing professional learning for all school staff

Our college leadership will continue to consult and collaborate with our students and school community as this work continues to build and unfold. I encourage all families to have conversations at home about the importance of inclusivity and respecting diversity. WHS must be a safe space for all and a collaborative approach between families, school staff and students will ensure ‘our’ school is a welcoming place where everyone in the school community can thrive.

### Events

It has been particularly pleasing to see events such as the swimming sports carnival, Year 12 Camp, student leadership camp and Year 11 orals taking place. Equally exciting is the upcoming whole-school athletics day and activities such as subject and year level camps and excursions returning to our program to re-engage our students as well as providing fantastic academic and social experiences. We hope to later this year - or certainly from next year - return to our program of family information nights at all year levels. These events are important to us because they help embed the vital three-way partnership that plays a key role in maximising the learning experience for all students.

### New Website

For the past six months we have been working with an external company to update and modernise our school website. I am pleased to announce that our website will go live on March 4. The website contains a wealth of information and is often the first stop for any member of the school community wanting to obtain information regarding the school. I would also like to publicly acknowledge and thank Laura DeLacy, our publications and reporting coordinator, for her work developing the new website.





### 2021 VCE and VCAL Results

The results our Year 12 students of 2021 achieved were simply outstanding. This, after experiencing two years of lockdowns, etc., makes their achievements even more significant. We were very pleased to see 35 students achieving ATARs of more than 90, with 45 percent attaining over 80 - the highest ever percentage over 80 for WHS. We also had three students achieve a perfect study score of 50 in the subjects of English (2) and Music Investigation. Our dux, Julian McIntyre, achieved an ATAR of 99.95. This is the highest possible ranking, with only 38 students out of over 50,000 across the state achieving this ATAR - and the first time ever a student at WHS has achieved this feat. With 99 percent of the cohort successfully obtaining their VCE certificate, the Year 12 cohort also achieved our highest ever mean ATAR, placing us amongst elite schools in terms of VCE outcomes.

Our Year 12 VCAL students were also very successful, with all achieving senior certificates and employment placements. Such certificates allow our VCAL students to pursue immediate employment opportunities as well as further study options such as advanced VET certificates.

We are pleased to hear our Year 12 students talking so fondly about their time at Williamstown High School and how the bonds they created with their peers and staff over the six years proved to be instrumental in helping them complete their secondary schooling. We wish the Class of 2021 the best of luck with their future endeavours and we look forward to hearing of their achievements in years to come.

### Focus for 2022 Staff Professional Learning and Curriculum Days

Following our four yearly self-evaluation and review in Term 4 last year we are currently finalising our new four-year strategic plan (2022-2025). Although there will be some minor changes, our findings led to recommendations to continue to consolidate and strengthen both the initiatives we have introduced in recent years and our overall goal of focusing on individual student growth in all areas (academic, social and emotional). Our 2022 Annual Implementation Plan will be finalised by the end of Term 1, once our strategic plan is endorsed, with both documents then being made available on the school website. A major focus of staff professional learning will be to continue to build authentic student agency inside the classroom as well as whole school literacy strategies for all curriculum areas. Supporting this work will be the implementation of Professional Learning Teams (PLTs) across the school. High impact evidence based teaching strategies and tools, such as self-reported grades, developmental rubrics and growth ladders, will continue to feature heavily in our professional learning.

### **Centenary Theatre and Purpose Built Year 12 Study Centre**

As you may have seen, the building work on our new VCE Centre and Theatre complex has been delayed. The project is being managed by the Victorian School Building Authority (VSBA) and during construction it became clear to their team that the building was not being built to their specifications. So they have suspended works at both buildings while an investigation is underway.

The VSBA is investigating whether there are any structural issues with the building work and whether remediation work is required as a result. This investigation is expected to take between 6-8 weeks.

## School Council Elections

Please find in this edition of the W-Files information about the upcoming School Council elections. Our School Council is dynamic and plays a key role in policy development and setting the direction of the school. I would encourage any interested parents or guardians to consider nominating. Please note, all school councillors are required to have a current Working with Children Check or acquire one once elected (this is free for volunteer categories). Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions related to the election process.

### Appendix A Fact Sheet 1. School council elections - Information for parents

#### What is a school council and what does it do?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally constituted bodies that are given powers to set the broad direction of a school in accordance with their constituting order and the Education and Training Reform Act 2006. In doing this, a school council is able to directly influence the quality of education that the school provides for its students.

#### Who is on the school council?

For most school councils, there are several possible categories of membership:

- A mandated elected Parent member category – more than one-third of the total members must be from this category. DET employees can be Parent members at their child's school as long as they are not engaged in work at the school
- A mandated elected DET employee member category – members of this category may make up no more than one-third of the total membership of school council. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members
- An optional Community member category – members are co-opted by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experiences. DET employees are not eligible to be Community members
- A small number of school councils have Nominee members
- For all schools with a Year 7 and above cohort, there is an additional mandated elected Student member category, making up two positions

Generally, the term of office for all members is two years. The term of office of half the members expires each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

#### Why is parent membership so important?

Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills that can help inform and shape the direction of the school. Those parents who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

#### Why is student membership so important

Students have a unique perspective on learning, teaching and schools. Having student members on school council allows students to have a say in the future direction of their school and ensures student input into decision making. Student representation on secondary school councils will assist in the development of students' skills, including leadership skills and communication skills.

#### Do I need special experience to be on school council?

Each member brings their own valuable life skills and knowledge to the role. However, councillors may need to develop skills and acquire knowledge in areas that are unfamiliar to them. It is important to have an interest in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future.

#### Code of conduct for school councillors

School councils in Victoria are public entities as defined by the Public Administration Act 2004. School councillors must abide by the Code of Conduct for Directors of Victorian Public Entities issued by the Victorian Public Sector Commission. The Code of Conduct is based on the Victorian public sector values and requires councillors to:

- act with honesty and integrity (be truthful, open and clear about their motives and declare any real, potential or perceived conflict of interest and duty)
- act in good faith in the best interests of the school (work cooperatively with other councillors and the school community, be reasonable, and make all decisions with the best interests of students foremost in their minds)
- act fairly and impartially (consider all relevant facts of an issue before making a decision, seek to have a balanced view, never give special treatment to a person or group and never act from self interest)
- use information appropriately (respect confidentiality and use information for the purpose for which it was made available)
- exercise due care, diligence and skill (accept responsibility for decisions and do what is best for the school)
- use the position appropriately (not use the position as a councillor to gain an advantage)
- act in a financially responsible manner (observe all the above principles when making financial decisions)
- comply with relevant legislation and policies (know what legislation and policies are relevant for which decisions and obey the law)
- demonstrate leadership and stewardship (set a good example, encourage a culture of accountability, manage risks effectively, exercise care and responsibility to keep the school strong and sustainable)

### **Indemnity for school council members**

School councillors are indemnified against any liability in respect of any loss or damage suffered by the council or any other person in respect of anything necessarily or reasonably done, or omitted to be done by the councillor in good faith in:

- a) the exercise of a power or the performance of a function of a councillor, or
- b) the reasonable belief that the act or omission was in the exercise of a power or the performance of a function of a council.

In other words, school councillors are not legally liable for any loss or damage suffered by council or others as a result of reasonable actions taken in good faith.

### **How can you become involved?**

The most obvious way is to participate in and vote in the school council elections, which are held in Term 1 each year. However, ballots are only held if more people nominate as candidates than there are positions vacant.

In view of this, you might consider:

- standing for election as a member of the school council
- encouraging another person to stand for election

### **School council induction video**

The school council induction video provides a summary of the purpose and responsibilities of school councils as well as the roles and responsibilities of school councillors. The video can be viewed on the [Department's website under School Councils](#)

### **What do you need to do to stand for election?**

The principal will issue a Notice of Election and Call for Nominations following the commencement of Term 1 each year. All school council elections must be completed by the end of March unless the usual timeline has been varied by the Minister. If you decide to stand for election, you can arrange for someone to nominate you as a candidate or you can nominate yourself in the Parent member category.

DET employees, whose child is enrolled in a school in which they are not engaged in work, are eligible to nominate for Parent membership of the school council at that school.

Once the nomination form is completed, return it to the principal within the time stated on the Notice of Election. You will receive a Nomination Form Receipt via post, email or by hand following the receipt of your completed nomination. If there are more nominations received than there are vacancies on council, a ballot will be conducted during the two weeks after the call for nominations has closed.

**Remember**

- Consider standing for election to school council
- Ask at the school for help if you would like to stand for election and are not sure what to do
- Be sure to vote if the election goes to ballot
- Contact the principal for further information

## Bayview Campus Principal Report

Dear parents and carers,

WHS rests on Bunurong Country and in this, my first contribution to the W-Files, I begin by acknowledging the Traditional Owners of this area. I look forward to continuing my work with our students and wider community as Bayview Campus Principal and hope that the commencement of our school year has been successful for you and your family.

### Returning to 'normal' schooling

Our school day commences at 8:48am and it is fantastic to be back on site everyday. All students need to be in class and learning at this time - the same applies to arriving to class on time after each break during the day. After two years of extended periods of flexible and remote learning, it is vital that we all work hard to get our students back into the routines of on-site learning. Teachers are working to ensure class time is engaging and challenging and 'in person' now.

This term may be a challenging time for your child, supporting them to get back into a routine of daily attendance, being on time and focusing in class and learning. Please contact our Student Wellbeing Team if you are finding this to be a difficult time.

### Our learning environment

I am seeking your support to further provide a safe and clean school and learning environment for our students. We have applied to Hobsons Bay City Council for a school crossing and supervisor to address some of the challenges for our students crossing Bayview Street to access school, and also for road users.

In the interim, please continue to exercise care in this area and continue to support your child to cross safely and wear a helmet if they ride to school (supervision in the grounds begins at 8:30am and concludes at 3:30pm on Bayview Street or when the last PTV bus departs).

### Our physical environment

Please support your child to bring food to school without single use packaging so that our school can be as free from waste as possible. Where not possible, ensure that waste is recyclable and placed in the appropriate bins we have at school. There is no excuse for littering - put your waste in the bin.

### Mobile Phone Policy

The state government's mobile phone policy is entering its third year in 2022. I ask that you continue to support us to implement the policy in regards to use of mobile phones, particularly in relation to 'students who choose to bring mobile phones to school must have them switched off and securely stored during school hours' and 'where students bring a mobile phone to school, the school must provide secure storage'. Our secure storage is our student lockers so please support your child to always use their combination lock.

### Communicating

I hope to be able to meet you in person when restrictions are further eased. Hopefully you've seen me outside the school entrance each day - please say hello if you can. Contact us via telephone as we are now back at school and no longer need to rely solely on electronic means of communication as may have been necessary during flexible and remote learning. Re-establishing normality is as important for us as adults as it is for our students now. Communication about important matters is more productive on the telephone or in person, in my view, as two way conversations can flow. Tone is not easy to gauge in an email.

## Pasco Campus Principal Report

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome all students, families and staff to the 2022 school year.

I want to thank all members of the school community for your efforts throughout the first few weeks of term. We have had a major focus on building meaningful connections across the campus as we look to cater for each and every student within a positive and safe learning environment.

The theme to start the year has been connectedness and positive mindsets. It is important we continue to encourage our students to connect with their learning but to also connect with those areas of interest outside the classroom.

Again, we have had to support both students and staff across the campus with the challenges of being in isolation due to COVID-19. We will continue to have open communication and supportive frameworks in place to allow our students to continue with their learning journey. I want to reassure students and families that we will continue to focus on supporting all students and staff throughout this time.

Our students have started the year with a firm commitment to their studies and developing positive relationships with their teachers and peers. This has been highlighted by the numerous conversations I have had with students, and as evidenced by the number of positive posts that have been recorded on Compass highlighting a range of positive contributions being made by our students.

We have had to run our Year 11 and 12 parent information sessions online and I want to thank the many students and parents/carers who attended these sessions. We are hoping that we can run our Year 10 parent information session on site later in the term and will have more details for parents about this.

I do encourage all parents/carers to stay connected with your child's learning journey by communicating with classroom teachers as required, checking Compass notifications regularly and also checking assessment and results as they come to hand as part of our continuous reporting model. I also encourage you to have an understanding of key curriculum and student engagement and wellbeing structures by viewing the [Pasco Campus Parent and Student Handbook](#).

In this W-Files you can read more about the recent Year 12 Camp and Student Leadership day, two significant events that assisted our Year 12 students and the student leadership team in best preparing for the year ahead.

We take pride in the achievements of all students in a range of different curriculum areas. The results of our Year 12 VCE and VCAL students in 2021 were exceptional. 95 percent of our students who applied for tertiary courses received an offer, and 71 percent of students received a first-round offer. The pathway options for our VCAL students after successfully completing their senior certificate allow students to best prepare for further study as well as immediate employment opportunities.

I would also like to take this opportunity to give you an overview of the Alumni Mentors Program that will again run in 2022 commencing **Week 6 - Monday, 7 March**.

We are pleased to continue with the Alumni Mentors Program this year, giving all students the opportunity to complete work at school beyond the normal school day. With the support of four Alumni Mentors, students will have access to library facilities and assistance should they require help with their studies.

The four mentors, who are all high achieving, recently graduated WHS students, will be available to assist students in the Pasco Library from 3:30-5:30pm on Monday and Wednesday afternoons. Melinda McKeegan (Inclusive Education Learning Specialist) will supervise on Monday afternoons, and Carly Terrens will be our Lead Mentor on Wednesday afternoons.

This program aims to establish a routine of completing coursework, study and revision in a distraction-free environment that also supports collaborative learning. An additional goal is for students to develop effective homework and time management skills, assisting with their mental health and therefore giving them more time for active and/or creative pursuits once their homework/study has been completed.

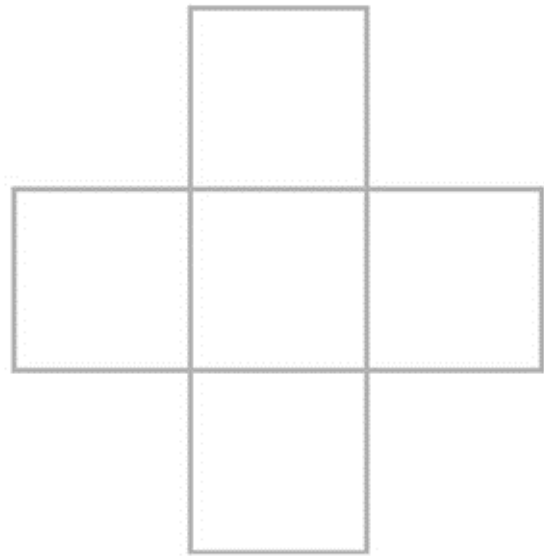

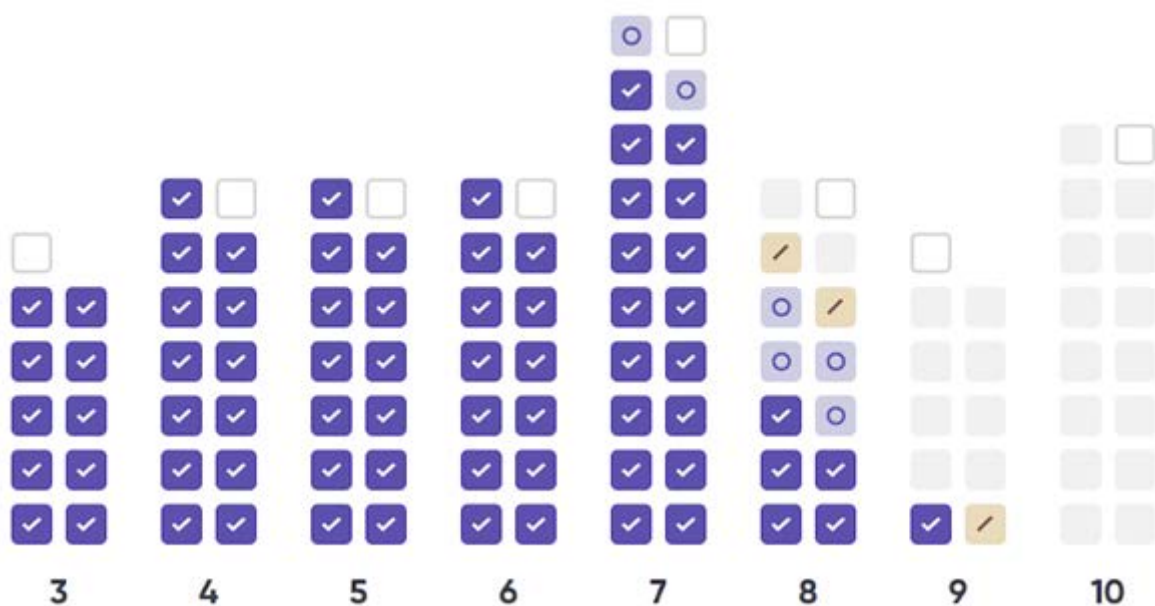

The Health and Physical Education team looks forward to a big year of learning, developing and experiencing success with all students in 2022.

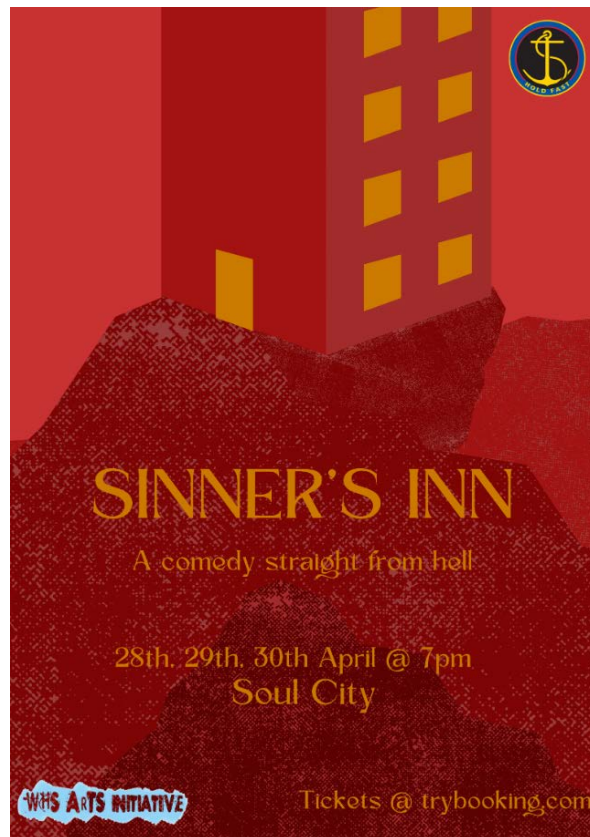

## Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use toward expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- **new student enrolments;** your child has started or changed schools this year.
- **changed family circumstances;** such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

# Student Accident Insurance Arrangements

## Main Points

- The DET does not provide personal accident insurance OR Ambulance cover for students.
- Parents/carers of students, who do not have student accident insurance/ambulance cover, are responsible for paying the cost of medical treatment for injured students, including the cost of ambulance attendance or transport as well as any other transport costs.
- Parents/carers can purchase insurance policies from commercial insurers.
- Parents/carers are responsible for paying the cost of medical treatment for injured students, including any transport costs.
- These costs may be recoverable where an injury is caused by the negligence (carelessness) of the DET, a school council or their employees or volunteers.
- Student accident insurance policies are available from some commercial insurers. These cover a range of medical expenses not covered by Medicare or private health insurance.

## Action Required

Parents/carers are responsible for paying the cost of medical treatment for injured students, including any transport costs. Reasonably low cost accident insurance policies may be purchased from commercial insurers.

It is essential to communicate with students and their parents about how their personal information will be handled in the school environment. One of the ways schools do this is by using collection statements (sometimes referred to as privacy statements or collection notices).

Using these collection statements is a critical activity in applying the Schools' Privacy Policy. All schools are required to adopt the Department's standardised statements.
