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Principal Report

Welcome to this month's edition of the W-Files. Responding to the COVID-19 pandemic has been a constant over the past two years, however, it is quite exciting to now be emerging from the latest phase of restrictions. I sense that many of us have a greater appreciation for what we previously may have taken for granted - the excitement (perhaps even a little relief) a number of families experienced in seeing their children returning to school, the satisfaction staff demonstrated in seeing students return to their classrooms and the joyous reactions students themselves displayed in reconnecting with their friends and teachers.

All this has been missed and, I believe, is very much appreciated right now and perhaps warrants us all taking a moment or two to reflect and look forward to what lies ahead. It has also been particularly pleasing to see our Year 12 students commence their exams and, hopefully, look forward to finishing their secondary schooling with a formal and graduation. I have also been quite pleased and proud to hear our teachers talking about delivering a number of hands-on tasks, like new recipes, experiments or group tasks, in the remaining weeks of this term - activities we believe benefit greatly the student learning experience. Our Head Start program at the senior campus has also been extended to ensure our students are well prepared for 2022.

Following recent announcements from the government, we will be receiving air purifiers for our classrooms and grants for shading to increase opportunities for learning in outdoor classrooms. The tutoring initiative funded this year will also be continued for 2022, and for us that will result in five or six English and Mathematics tutors working across the college with a number of students and classes.

Despite the challenges of the pandemic, we are pleased to report we have successfully continued our work finalising student subject choices, campus timetables and staffing arrangements for the 2022 school year. It is this forward planning that enables us to launch into the new year in such an organised and smooth way.

New Uniform Item

We have continued to develop a new school jumper. Following feedback from 890 families and the creation of a jumper working party (with parent, student and staff representation), we have worked closely with our uniform supplier designers and are close to finalising a modern design for a new jumper. At present, options for a new colour and material are being considered. Both of these aspects are initiating many healthy discussions at the school council level and we will take the time to gather extensive information before we make a recommendation and seek further feedback. We are hoping this can be finalised by the end of this year.

Curriculum Day Update

Once again, we decided to postpone our curriculum day from 1 November to later this term to allow our students to return to their classes as soon as possible. We will discuss and communicate an alternative time, perhaps late November or early December, to ensure our staff experience the professional learning on literacy strategies for our Year 7-12 classes. The day will be student free and formal notification will be sent by the campus principals closer to the date.

Performing Arts and Study Centre Building Project

Despite restrictions being lifted, progress has been slowed and our architects are now indicating the project will not be completed this year. The Victorian School Building Authority continues to work with the architects and builders to ensure this project can be completed as early as possible but is also making sure no short cuts are being taken. The structural engineers are hoping to have all information in the near future to complete their recommendations. I will continue to provide updates through Term 4 via the W-Files.

Bayview Campus Principal Report

After a number of weeks of a staggered return to the campus, I can honestly say that the joy of students reconnecting has given a real boost to energy levels across the campus. We will continue to have in place a number of restrictions even though we have all returned to campus from 1 November. We look forward to reimagining what life will look like together as a community.

As each year level returned on site, we dedicated time and resources to help rebuild any lost connections and boost the learning confidence of all students by running a series of wellbeing and engagement activities. From all accounts, this time was well received and was a wonderful launching pad to getting back to a sense of normality.

A return to school is an exciting and emotional time for students. They have been looking forward to seeing their friends, settling back into daily routines, and discovering what the "new normal" looks like. Consider the following set of tips for parents and carers when supporting your children and their return to on-site learning:

Be positive about returning to school

- Ask your child how they are feeling about returning to school. Your child may be feeling a mix of emotions about their return so it is important to listen to any concerns and respond in a calm, supportive and reassuring way.
- Promote positivity by asking what they like about school and what they are looking forward to.
- If they feel nervous or worried, help them understand this is a normal reaction, and that you and their teachers are there to support them.
- If your child has questions about COVID-19, provide factual and age-appropriate information. Let them know everyone at school is working hard so that everyone is safe.
- Consider limiting media content your child is viewing if it is contributing to worry or distress.
- Remind your child that everyone at school is working hard to make sure that everyone is safe and that anyone unwell will stay home.

Prepare yourself and your child for changes and new school procedures

- Look at the school website, Facebook page and newsletters to learn about new procedures that may have been introduced such as changes to parents' access to the school grounds, drop off and pick up points, as well as new rules such as wearing face masks or hygiene protocols.
- Discuss these with your child and plan together how these changes will be managed. The more your child understands the changes, the more comfortable they are likely to feel.

Re-establish your routines

- Routines help provide certainty and increase feelings of security, so it will help to re-establish routines and plan for the return.
- Bring back the usual wake-up, bed, and breakfast routines. Set aside time to find school equipment and check uniforms and shoes still fit your child may have grown. Give yourself enough time to organise replacements or a uniform alternative if needed.

At the end of the school day

- Talk to your child about their day and what they are looking forward to tomorrow.
- Provide opportunities for your child to play and relax after school. Returning to school may contribute to tired and emotional reactions at the end of the day.
- Help re-establish after-school routines to review the day's learning and complete homework tasks.
- Consider having extra family time together as your child may have missed being at home with you.

Supporting your child

- Getting used to school routines again may take some time. Reassure your child that this is normal. Encourage them to ask for help if they need it.
- If they are finding things difficult, remind your child of times in the past when they were able to do difficult things and face situations that made them nervous or scared.
- If you are concerned about your child, seek support by contacting your child's homegroup teacher or Student Management Leader.

Update the school

• Let the school know of any concerns relating to your child that may impact their transition back to school. This will assist the school to work with you to plan and put in place appropriate support strategies.

As the 2021 school year draws close to its end, the Pasco Student Leadership Team have had a busy few weeks of returning to school, finishing up their subjects, and completing final assessments and exams. As their year wraps up and, for the Year 12s, their time as student leaders is almost over, we have begun the process of finding our next capable group of students to form the 2022 Student Leadership Team.

At the end of Term 3, applications were opened to the current crop of Year 11 students to represent their peers during their final year of school. In past years, applicants for Year 12 leadership positions were required to submit a physical written application, responding to a selection of questions. But this year hasn't been like every other year. Applications have gone digital, with students applying via a Google Form. A total of 25 Year 11 students have applied for positions, with nine of those applying specifically to be the 2022 school captains.

The school captain applicants were also asked to upload a short campaign video with their application, which has since been shown to all students across Years 9, 10 and 11 (next year's Pasco students). These students were then given the opportunity to vote for two students they would most like to see representing them in 2022. At time of writing, 297 students had submitted their votes. The final part of the application process for school captain is a panel interview. The successful candidates will be announced soon.

The positions of art captain, drama captain, House captains, journalism captain, music captain, respectful relationships captain, social justice captain and VCAL captain will also soon be decided based on their written applications. Announcements for these positions will be followed by the opening of applications for five year level representatives each at Year 10 and 11. Year 9 and 10 students will be contacted shortly about the application process for these roles.







Numeracy Report

How many dots?

To create a triangle, you need to connect a minimum of three dots. How many dots are required to create a triangle with angles of 1°, 89° and 90°?

Maths with context continues to play a significant role in making concepts accessible for all students. This will continue to be a focus with students back on site at school.



Progress tracking and goal setting will soon become even more transparent between students and caregivers. Waypoints was trialled this year and has received positive feedback. The next step is to

teach students how to identify, record and communicate which skills they have mastered and which skills they can still improve on.



Teaching and learning remotely has presented many challenges. Despite this, students have continued to perform exceptionally well across a number of assessments, particularly in NAPLAN. The return to on-site learning has been an important and welcoming step, however, I'm also confident that we are prepared for whatever lies ahead.

Learning Specialist Report

At the Pasco Campus this year, we have continued encouraging a growth mindset in students. This work began in January on Year 12 Camp and has continued despite the challenges of remote learning. To foster student agency and help students keep themselves motivated, a strategy we implemented this year is creating visual reminders of how they can use positive self-talk to approach a task even when facing difficulties.

These visuals have been constructed in conjunction with our students and can now be found in our classrooms at the Pasco Campus. Another goal for 2021 was to remind students of the school's instructional model, SIMPLE. Our hopes are that students will be more aware of the way teachers structure lessons and use their metacognitive skills to take more responsibility for ensuring that they understand the purpose of activities and then can link, evaluate and reflect appropriately. This will be a continued focus for our students as we look forward to stability in the classroom for 2022.

Curriculum Report

Bayview Campus

At the time of writing, the Bayview Campus has all students and staff back on deck - it's great to be back in the face-to-face environment and to again hear the "good noise" of students conversing with other students and teachers, and collaborating in person. Many thanks to all students and families for their efforts to support and complete coursework in the different settings we have been learning and teaching in this semester. As we near the end of the year we will again be holding Year 9 exams, which aim to provide an authentic exam experience for all, and in particular for those students undertaking VCE subjects in 2022.

Semester 2 exams are scheduled to occur in the week beginning **Monday, 29 November** (Week 9). We encourage Year 9s to be familiar with the exam rules and responsibilities listed below. More information is to come via a letter to parents/guardians in the coming weeks.

Year 9 Examination Period - Semester 2, 2021 | Student Examination Rules and Responsibilities

What students are allowed to bring into the exam room:

- <u>Full school uniform</u> must be worn during the exam period.
- Only required equipment can be taken into the exam room **NO** bags, pencil cases, liquid paper, books or mobile devices are allowed.
- <u>Students cannot</u> share materials eg. rulers, calculators, dictionaries.
- Approved materials and equipment for each examination are set and communicated by the classroom teacher. It is the student's responsibility to bring only approved materials to each examination.
- <u>NO</u> food or drink, other than water, is allowed in the exam room. The water bottle must be in a clear plastic container and any labels must be removed.

Students arriving late:

• Students arriving late must have the arrival time indicated on the front of their paper but will not receive extra time.

During the exam:

- Students are permitted to read only during Reading Time <u>NO</u> marking of papers, use of calculators, etc. can occur during this time. They may only read the exam paper and their dictionary (if permitted).
- Students must not communicate with other students or act to cause nuisance when the exam is being conducted.
- Students who do not follow exam protocols may be removed from the exam room and receive a '0%' result.
- In seeking clarification or assistance during exams, students must raise their hand and wait for an exam supervisor to assist (where appropriate).
- Students must stop writing when instructed by the supervisor.
- Students must remain in the exam room for the duration of the allocated exam time.


Science Report

Anatomy of a Neuron

Students brought in their models and we completed a learning walk analysing the accuracy, but also applauding the creativity, of the different representations of a neuron. Project Based Work: Supporting Those Who Need It Most

As part of the 11VCAL course, students had to plan a group based project/activity that would support an organisation of their choosing. This led to all groups deciding to link their project back to supporting a not-for-profit organisation connected to the issue of homelessness.

The **homegroup food drive** project is running during Week 5. All students from Years 10 and 11 are being encouraged to bring in donation items during homegroup. These can be placed in marked donation boxes in homegroup rooms that will be collected and sorted in preparation for donation to the Salvation Army. Well done to Kasey Bowyer and Naomi Charter who planned this project. Thank you to the other class members who made the completion of this project possible.

All students will use the planning and execution of these projects to demonstrate and evaluate their use of eight key employability skills: communication, teamwork, technology, learning, planning and organising, initiative and enterprise, problem solving and self management.


Young Women of Willi Report
